Some of Alison's enduring memories are watching the students at the Law School in Asmara experience Sir Peter Cresswell's lecture and attending the presentation of the insignia of the Knighthood of the Order of Skanderburg to the late Sir Henry Brooke by the President of Albania in recognition of his and the Foundation's work. Alison worked together with the Bingham Centre for the Rule of Law to assist a visiting group of Palestinian judges and was a part of the Slynn Foundation team which secured funding for the current Foundation project in Tanzania.
